
BAPTISMS, NEW BUILDINGS, AND RESTRUCTURING 1995-2000 REPORT

New Schools and Facilities

Picture Removed Presda Primary School, in Pretoria, opened in 1933 with 12 pupils. Today, it has an enrollment of 140. In 1999, a new school was built with modern facilities, a school hall, and

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appreciation must be expressed to the school administrators, who have run an effective program and managed the finances so efficiently.

The newly established Namibia Field, with headquarters at Windhoek, recently expressed an interest in establishing a school in that area. Arrangements are being made to start a pre-primary school as a church project this year. A plan has been devised to provide for an elementary school and a secondary school for Windhoek within a five-year period.

We have two tertiary institutions, Helderberg and Bethel colleges. Helderberg has a full complement of staff and students and is functioning well, while Bethel College, under the guidance of its new rector, will be restructuring and diversifying its course offerings in order to meet the changing needs of its constituency.
